1. Please check which stormwater tool you would like to have installed:

- Rain Barrel
- Downspout Planter
- Rain Garden
- Permeable pavers (in place of existing pavement)
- Depaving

What happens next?

To have a whole-house assessment, you must first submit an assessment fee of \$25. The assessment fee is non-refundable. You will receive a full report with recommendations for all feasible stormwater tools. After receiving the assessment report, you can choose which stormwater tool you would like to have installed. Then we will connect you with a preapproved contractor for a consultation visit at your home.

The consultation fee is \$25 and is non-refundable, however if you choose to proceed with the installation, the \$25 will be credited toward the final cost of the project.

If you choose a downspout planter box, you must submit a \$75 installation fee after the consultation (\$100 total - \$25 credit).

If you choose a rain garden, de-paving or permeable pavers, following the consultation you will receive an estimate showing the total for the project, the Rain Check contribution, and the remaining balance to you. Pending approval of the estimate on both your end and ours, we issue the contractor with a Notice to Proceed with the installation. PHS will pay the program subsidy to the contractor while any remaining balance is directly payable by you to the contractor.
